Message From The Rabbi



Ignaz Trebitsch is surely one of the most bizarre characters in modern Jewish history, for he was born a Jew in Hungary in 1879, and attended Heder, although he was baptized as a Lutheran in

German at the age of twenty. From the time he went to Canada, where he was confirmed by the Anglican archbishop of Montreal and ordained deacon. His main job there was trying to convert Jews to Christianity.

In 1903, he moved to England, and became a curate of an Anglican parish in Kent. When he inherited some money, he left the ministry (the Archbishop of Canterbury's comment was ("no great loss"), and decided to run for Parliament although he was a Hungarian citizen at the time. He managed to obtain British nationality in time for the election and won the seat, having been endorsed by David Lloyd George and Winston Churchill. His extravagant lifestyle, however, brought him financial problems, especially since Members of Parliament were not paid at that time, and he did not run again for office as a Parliamentary candidate.

During World War I, he offered his services as a double agent to both England and Germany. In order to escape arrest as a spy in England, he fled to the United States, where he published "Confessions of an International Spy" and was arrested for fraud. After escaping from a Brooklyn jail, he was finally extradited back to England, convicted, and jailed there for three years.

Following his release in 1919, he went to Berlin, where he participated in a short-lived revolution against the German government. He was in charge of press information. After the revolution failed, he was prominent in the so-called "white international",

which sought to battle the Communist "red international." When the white international fell apart as a result of internal quarrels, he stole its documents and sold them to the Czech government for a handsome sum.

He spent the last part of his life in China, one of the few places he could enter without fear of arrest. From 1922 he acted as adviser and arms procurer for various Chinese warlords. A mystical experience drew him to Buddhism, but he had to interrupt his studies of that religion when he received news that his son was about to be hanged for murder in England. He traveled to Europe but was too late to see his son, and was in any case not allowed to enter England.

After he returned to China, he was ordained a Buddhist monk, and later awarded himself the title of abbot in Shanghai, where he attracted a small group of faithful followers, whom he persuaded to donate to him virtually all their possessions.

During World War II he approached the German consul in Shanghai, asking to be allowed to meet Hitler, whom he was sure would immediately be aware of his supernatural powers The consul relayed the suggestion to Berlin, but received a reply which said: "Surely you are aware that he is a Jew."

Trebitsch Lincoln spent his last months in a Shanghai YMCA preaching Buddhism. His last a Jewish interview with was newspaper, in which he outlined a plan for a settlement of Jewish refugees near Shanghai, which he envisaged as "a miniature Tel Aviv." Trebitsch died in 1943.

Greetings to all in our Kol Emeth community. As we celebrated Pesach several weeks ago, we were called on to remember our liberation from bondage in Egypt. At the same time, we seek to

free ourselves from the spiritual bondage that can engulf and limit our greater aspirations. In the cycle of the seasons we hope to see our release from the discontent of the cold bondage of winter to the first warm breezes that announce the coming of a glorious summer. Our congregational life moves through the milestones of the years never resting and always striving to meet the needs of our community. I firmly believe we all gain in our own ways by participation in our various synagogue activities. Under the leadership of Rabbi Schechter our Sabbath services can be a spiritual oasis from the many cares that often ensnare us. Our traditional services are almost a functioning "time machine". We might enter in 618, 2018, or, even 2218 and feel at home. We might be anywhere in the world and find welcome. This tradition is both timeless and wonderfully portable. It encourages a faith in a power beyond ourselves but never requires us to take leave of our intellect or humanity.
