Message From The Rabbi



Dear Friends:

I write this as further news is coming in of the horrendous attack on the synagogue in Pittsburgh, which has taken eleven Jewish lives—the worst attack on Jews in the history of the United States.

This Sunday morning at Kol Emeth we held a special service where we all recited the Kaddish together for the victims. I spoke about this unimaginable event that has shaken us, Jews, and all of America, to the core. We recalled the letter from George Washington to the Hebrew Congregation in Newport, Rhode Island, on 18 August 1790, which includes the words: “For happily the Government of the United States... gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance.”

To bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance—George Washington used these beautiful words in connection with the United States government, for it was governments, rulers all over Europe, who persecuted Jews, expelled them, killed them. This country was a place of refuge from such persecution. Individuals, on the other hand, often did behave badly to Jews. Many of us have memories of universities that operated quotas against Jews, law firms that refused to employ Jews, hotels that refused to cater to Jews. Leo Frank, a Jew, was lynched in the south. Father Coughlin broadcast vicious attacks on Jews to vast radio audiences.

But, we thought, this was all in the past. For us Jews, America had taken its place as the most welcoming country in the world (outside of Israel): no more quotas against Jews, no more discrimination in employment, in hotels, in housing. Jews have reached prominent positions in academia, government, and the media. So we thought.

But then last year came the Charlottesville march, where we heard hundreds shouting: “The Jews will not replace us.” And now—this mass murder of Jews in our beloved United States of America.

What has happened? Well, there have always been hate groups on the margins, people who harbor sick and evil thoughts about Jews. But now, they have the internet. The internet itself is a wonderful instrument for bringing good people together. You can take classes from teachers in far-away lands. If you are sick or immobile, you can communicate in the most detailed way with friends all over the world. Unfortunately, the internet also brings evil people together. A hater can unite with like-minded, or rather like-mindless, haters in all parts of the country. He can feel part of a group, his sick views validated, reinforced, encouraged.

At the same time, public discourse has become coarsened, so that remarks or statements which once would have shocked and appalled us have become so commonplace that they no longer have this effect. We have become numb.

What can we do? Regrettably we will have to do what our coreligionists in Europe have done, and have guards in our Jewish institutions, our JCC's, our synagogues. We have no choice about this.

But there is also a question of attitude. We must ‘de-numb’ ourselves, insist that we continue to be shocked, outraged when we hear statements from anyone in public life, high or low, right or left, that are hate-filled, and call them out on this. We too, have access to the media, to the internet. We must not despair, we must not give up. We must not fail to fight for the decency, the goodness, the generosity of spirit that has been, and can again be the essence of our United States.

Remember how George Washington ended that letter in 1790:

“May the Children of the Stock of Abraham, who dwell in this land, continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other Inhabitants; while everyone shall sit in **Rabbi's Message Continued on page 2**


Men's Club News
