Rabbi's Message

Thoughts on Thanksgiving and Hanukkah

When I first arrived in the US all those years ago, I was amazed and thrilled to be present at a kosher Thanksgiving dinner. I know you'll think this reaction a little overblown, but let me explain. Having grown up in England, which was kind enough to have given my parents sanctuary from the Nazis in 1938, I nevertheless felt alienated, as a Jew, from general society. As the child of immigrants in a society that then referred to immigrants, not entirely flatteringly, as foreigners, I would also read articles and hear programs that made me feel a member of some exotic tribe with strange and bizarre customs.

Then I arrive here and join in a celebration that encompasses all the people in this country, all religions, creeds, races. For the first time I felt that I really belonged somewhere. In fact it was only then that I became aware of how alienated I had felt all those years growing up in England, rather as you sometimes become aware of a headache or an irritation only after it stops and you feel free of it for the first time. So for me, being present at that Thanksgiving dinner was a new and strange and wonderful feeling.

That is why I am a little saddened to learn that some Orthodox Jews do not join in this celebration, for reasons best known to them. We are, after all, part and parcel of this remarkable country, we should feel kinship with all our fellow-Americans, and we should also give thanks for the existence of the United States, what it means to the world, to us as Americans, and, especially, to us as Jews.

This spirit is well expressed by a prayer composed for Thanksgiving by the late Rabbi Joseph Lookstein and recited at services in Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun (Orthodox) in New York in 1940:

We pray sincerely for America and the ideals of democracy and freedom that are here enshrined. May she be strong to withstand all the currents that assail her and all the forces of evil that would invade her sacred precincts. A tower of light to her own citizenry, may she cast a steady beam and light up all the dark areas of the world and show to a perplexed and straying humanity the path of freedom, of life and of peace.

So much for Thanksgiving.

How widely known Hanukkah is (or was) in England can be gauged from this conversation I had in London with a (Jewish!) friend, a lady then in her 80's:

"What is the name of the Jewish holiday that comes around Christmas time?" she asked. "Peggy," I said, "it is called Hanukkah. And would it surprise you to learn that in Chicago where I live, a great number of people who are not Jewish know the name of this holiday?" She was amazed.

Again, on my arrival in the US, I was surprised, and elated to find that Jewish holidays-Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur, Hanukkah-were well-known to the population at large, and not just to Jewish people. Of course someone is going to tell me, rightly, that while this is true for large cities here, once you go to smaller communities, the non-Jewish population won't know what I'm talking about. But remember, I am comparing like with like. I grew up in London, not some small English village. It was in London that I had this conversation about Hanukkah with my elderly friend. And it was in London that I found that even if these holidays were known, they were considered strange and exotic.

Thus both the experience of Thanksgiving and Hanukkah made me feel at home in America, almost immediately on arrival, and it is here that I have stayed.
