Message From The Rabbi



CHOOSE LIFE!

These two simple words come towards the end of the Torah. They speak to us especially at the High Holidays, and even more especially at these High Holidays, when we witness regimes in the world

whose sole aim is the destruction of life.

The word CHAYIM, life, recurs again and again during the High Holidays. Zochreinu la-chayim Remember us for Life, we sing, melech chafets ba-chayim 0 king who desires Life, vechat'veinu besefer ha-chayim and inscribe us in the book of Life. We ask G-d to remember us for life, to inscribe us in the Book of Life. But what are we doing? Are we involved in life? Are we making sure that we are enjoying our life to the fullest?

I know, you will say: What has enjoyment of life to do with the High Holidays? Are they not supposed to be a serious, sad time? They are serious, yes, solemn, but definitely not sad. We are supposed to examine our actions and determine to do better in the future. And we are optimistic that we have the capacity to improve. No, Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur are not sad times. And the Jewish religion is not a sad religion. On the contrary, it sets its face decidedly against asceticism, against the denial of pleasure as a moral discipline.

At the end of the Jerusalem Talmud, we read this: Rav said: 'On Judgement Day, a person will have to give account for every good thing which his eye saw and he did not enjoy.' Think of it, you had a chance to enjoy something, someone, and you failed to do so, you will be held to account for this failure.

Why do we fail to take enjoyment in this world when it is there for us? Why do we not enjoy the beautiful things in this world, our relationships, our loved ones? Because we are hurried, we are worried, we are stressed, or we are waiting, waiting for when we retire, when we have time, when there will be less work, more money, the golden years, the kids are grown, any reason, any excuse not to enjoy NOW.

How sad it is when we look back and say: I wish I had not waited. How wonderful it is when we look back and say: I took the opportunities that were there.

Let us start now. By embracing life, by taking all it has to offer, we affirm that Judaism is a religion of life, of Chayim, and the best answer to those who believe and practice its opposite.

Julie and I would like to wish you all a Happy, Healthy New Year of 5773.



Dr. D. and Me: A Tribute to Dr. David Rosen

"**Dr. D.**" was the nickname I gave **Dr. David Rosen** on the first day we met over 30 years ago. I write this in tribute to him with tears in my eyes and a void in my heart. I cling to the wonderful memories of our relationship, as we became friends and he, my mentor.

Being on the Board of Directors we supported each other on Committees. He always was at the helm giving Kol Emeth success after success.

Dr. D. started to groom me in becoming a committee organizer. We outlined on paper every fine detail, then it was put into action. If Plan A didn't work there was always a Plan B and Plan C. He taught me how to think ahead, and always say, "what if?" He developed my leadership and writing skills and everything else that came up.

He was a soft spoken, intelligent and articulate man, knowledgeable on any subject. Fairness was his game, seeing all situations, trying to appease all.

He moved onto the Executive Committee and then became President. He then needed a Vice President with the intention of that person becoming the next President. Yours truly fit that role, so began the working partnership for Kol Emeth. Speeches from the Bima were a breeze for **Dr. D.** He always had one key word on an envelope and he could speak for as long as needed. We shared life cycle events over the years that transformed me into a very strong person.

For eight consecutive years, 1986 – 1994 we alternated the positions of President and Vice President for each other. These were very productive and successful years with overwhelming support from our congregants.

On the nights of the Executive Board and Board of Directors meetings I looked forward to our dinners together discussing the agenda and anything pertaining to Kol Emeth. For eight years we ate at the same restaurant and ordered the same chicken dinner.

Dr. D. was on every Committee imaginable. He was Men's Club Man of the Year, sang in our choir, headed the PAC Committee and represented our Synagogue in all Community affairs. He was the best comedian with his wonderful sense of humor.

When I visited **Dr. D.** for the last time, he still was interested in all that was happening in the Synagogue. His eyes lit up and he smiled with all my stories and said, "Keep up the good work." With that I kissed him good-bye and gave him a big smile. **Dr. D.** cared to the very end.

I will forever be grateful for all he taught me that helped me rise to the challenge of being President and in my everyday life.

I will truly miss him.

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Blowing Of The Shofar On Rosh Hashana

During the blowing of the shofar on Rosh Hashana, notice there are three distinct sounds:

- 1. Tekiah>> one long, straight blast
- 2. Shevarim>> three medium, wailing sounds
- 3. Teruah>> 9 quick blasts in short succession

Let's examine each of these shofar sounds, and see how they relate to the different themes of Rosh Hashana.

The Tekiah Sound

Rosh Hashana is the day of appreciating who God is. We then internalize that understanding so that it becomes a living, practical part of our everyday reality. God is all-powerful. God is the Creator. God is the Sustainer. God is the Supervisor. In short, God is King of the Universe.

But for many of us, the idea of a "king" conjures up images of a greedy and power-hungry despot who wants to subjugate the masses for his selfish aims.

In Jewish tradition, a king is first and foremost a servant of the people. His only concern is that the people live in happiness and harmony. His decrees and laws are only for the good of the people, not for himself. (see Maimonides, Laws of Kings 2:6)

The object of Rosh Hashana is to crown God as our King. Tekiah (the long, straight shofar blast) is the sound of the King's coronation. In the Garden of Eden, Adam's first act was to proclaim God as King. And now, the shofar proclaims to ourselves and to the world: God is our King. We set our values straight and return to the reality of God as the One Who runs the world... guiding history, moving mountains, and caring for each and every human being individually and personally.

Maimonides adds one important qualification: It isn't enough that God is MY King alone. If ALL humanity doesn't recognize God as King, then there is something lacking in my own relationship with God. Part of my love for the Almighty is to help guide all people to an appreciation of Him. Of course this is largely an expression of my deep caring for others. But it also affects my own sense of God's all-encompassing Kingship.

The Shevarim Sound

When we think about the year gone by, we know

deep down that we've failed to live up to our full potential. In the coming year, we yearn not to waste that opportunity ever again. The Kabbalists say that Shevarim (three medium, wailing blasts) is the sobbing cry of a Jewish heart, yearning to connect, to grow, to achieve.

Every person has the ability to change and be great. This can be accomplished much faster than you ever dreamed of. The key is to pray from the bottom of your heart and ask God for the ability to become great. Don't let yourself be constrained by the past. You know you have enormous potential.

At the moment the shofar is blown, we cry out to God from the depths of our soul. This is the moment when our souls stand before the Almighty without any barriers that we can truly let go.

The Teruah Sound

On Rosh Hashana, we need to wake up and be honest and objective about our lives: Who we are, where we've been, and which direction we're headed. The Teruah sound (9 quick blasts in short succession) resembles an alarm clock, arousing us from our spiritual slumber. The shofar brings clarity, alertness, and focus.

The Talmud says: "When there's judgement from below, there's no need for judgement from above." What this means is that if we take the time to construct a sincere, realistic model of how we've fallen short in the past, and what we expect to change in the future, then God doesn't need to "wake us up" to what we already know.

God wants us to make an honest effort to maximize the gifts He gave us. You aren't expected to be anything you're not. But you can't hoodwink God, either.

The reason we lose touch and make mistakes is because we don't take the time everyday to reconnect with our deepest desires and essence. The solution is to spend time alone everyday, asking: Am I on track? Am I focused? Am I pursuing goals which will make the greatest overall difference in my life and in the world?

Make it a habit to keep in touch with yourself, and when Rosh Hashana comes around, the alarm clock of the shofar won't be nearly as jarring!
