Purim's Wakeup Call

Purim is unfolding again right before our very eyes. How can we go about business as usual?

A Sleeping Nation

When Haman targeted the Jews for annihilation, he said to Achashveirosh, "Let's destroy the Jews." Achashveirosh replied, "Not so fast. I am afraid of their God, lest He do to me what He did to my predecessors."

Haman relieved the King of that fear when he said "Yeshno am echad," which translates literally as "there is a certain nation." The Talmud (Megillah 13b), using a play on words, explains that Haman was telling the King something much more strategic and insightful. Yoshnu am echad - there is a sleeping nation. They have been negligent of mitzvot, they are divided, fighting with one another and divisive. They are asleep as to what is important and what threatens them, Haman pointed out to the King.

The Jews were on the brink of extinction, because they were asleep.

The Jewish people were vulnerable and on the brink of extinction because they were asleep. Their eyes were closed to what was happening around them. They didn't take the threats seriously. Haman, like so many of our shrewd enemies throughout Jewish history, understood that going about business as usual, living with our eyes closed and sleep walking through life makes us particularly vulnerable and susceptible to attack.

Haman recognized that "there is a nation that is sleeping." All he had to do was continue to lull the Jewish people into a false sense of security, to breed complacency and apathy, and he could accomplish his goal of ridding the world of our people.

So what spoiled his plan? The answer is simple: Mordechai and Esther stood up and, like an alarm, rang and rang until they woke up our people from their practically comatose sleep.

Mordechai understood that the antidote to "the nation that is sleeping" is as the Book of Esther states, "lech knos kol ha'yehudim - go and gather all the Jews together" and wake them up. He understood that the response to "they are scattered and dispersed" is to bring them together in fasting and praying. That wakeup call saved our people and ignited a response that provided not only the spark that led to military victory but attracted people of Shushan to want to join the Jewish people.

Purim Then and Now

I look around today and can't help but think our people have been lulled asleep into a false sense of security once again, making ourselves vulnerable. Our enemies are no less evil than Haman, their plans no less nefarious, and their goal no less threatening to our very existence. And yet, for so many, it is business as usual, eyes shut to what is happening and threatening us. Now is the time to wake up,

Automatic Defibrillator for Kol Emeth

Kol Emeth purchased an automatic defibrillator (AED) (a Philips Heartstart FRx). It is now available for use. You may have already noticed it in the white wall cabinet installed on the landing between the main entrance lobby and the lower level.

The defibrillator is VERY EASY to use. No training is required. Anyone/everyone is capable of using it. It will tell you exactly what to do. The defibrillator will not harm the victim; it will transmit a shock only when it recognizes that a patient needs one. You cannot hurt a person by applying the AED.

If someone appears to suffer a cardiac arrest:

- CALL 911.
- If CPR is needed, and if someone is able to perform CPR, that person should begin CPR.
- While waiting for the paramedics to arrive, another person should retrieve the defibrillator. The defibrillator cabinet door will sound an alarm when the door is opened, and closing the door will silence the alarm.
- Bring the defibrillator in the red case to the scene.
- Open the defibrillator case.
- Press the green on/off button.
- Follow the straightforward verbal instructions that the AED then automatically provides.

I strongly recommend you watch a demonstration video on the use of this defibrillator. You never know if or when you will be presented the opportunity to save a life. Enter "You-Tube Philips Heartstart FRx AED demonstration video" in the Google search box. YouTube offers several helpful demonstration videos for this model of defibrillator. Alternatively, you may go to our Kol Emeth website. Under the "links" option select "Defibrillator (AED) demonstration video."

now is the time to come together in prayer, and in fasting, in letter writing, phone calls, advocacy, lobbying and any way that we can raise our voice on behalf of our people.

Do you think Israel is going to attack Iran? Or do you think no attack will take place and Iran will be allowed to go nuclear? Do you realize that either option is an absolute disaster, potentially devastating and earth-shattering? Do you truly understand the scenario and the casualties if Israel attacks Iran? Can you even imagine the rockets raining down throughout the country, terrorist attacks, condemnations from around the world seeking to isolate Israel, a possible embargo?

And if no attack happens, do you understand the threat and reality of a nuclear weapon held at Israel's head? And if we do understand, how can we possibly remain asleep and go about business as usual?

Purim is unfolding again right before our very eyes. Iran is modern-day Persia and Ahmadinejad is modern-day Haman sharing the same, explicit goal – to wipe out, in minutes, 6 million Jews.

We must not allow that to happen.

We have an obligation to remember Amalek and what they sought to do to us. The Torah says it is not enough to "not forget." You can be asleep and yet not forget somewhere buried in your memory that these were once enemies. No, we must also "remember" – zachor. We must remember at all times what our enemies are capable of and never feel a false sense of security.

Remembering David Rosen, a true mensch

I hardly can find words to describe the good character of David Rosen, a close friend for almost 50 years, who passed away recently.

I was assigned to work under his supervision as a resource assistant in BBYO's (B'nai B'rith Youth Organization) Greater Chicago Region. Dave, at that time 38, was a well-known and highly respected social worker. He had been BBYO director since 1946, and was responsible for providing service to 3,000 Jewish teenagers in Chicago. A network of eight full-time social workers and 15 field supervisors, plus more than 100 volunteer chapter advisors, worked under his leadership; the largest Jewish youth organization in the Midwest.

It was a unique experience to learn from him the Jewish American way of life and the American ways of doing things. We were happy to cooperate on strengthening the lewish heritage aspect of the BBYO program. Together we initiated the establishment of the Chicago Jewish Youth Council in 1966, bringing together all the youth organizations in Chicago.

We tried together to bring the youngsters closer to the state of Israel as an important part of their Jewish identity. We tried to persuade the teenagers to visit Israel within their own B'nai B'rith program. He led several trips to Israel with youth or synagogue groups.

Dave was born in the old Jewish "Vest" side, a son of Meyer Rosen and Minnie Gozansky, immigrants from Poland and Russia. Yiddish was spoken at home and Dave often used Yiddish words and phrases to put people at ease or bring humor to a situation. As a child,

Dave joined his parents in a family Yiddish theater. His mother Minnie was the presenter of the Yiddish weekly radio hour in Chicago. He told me that she cried when the program had to be discontinued.

Dave and his family were longtime residents of Highland Park, near Ravinia (a perfect location for a music fan). He was a graduate of Penn Elementary School and Marshall High School. He was a player on his high school basketball team, which won 98 consecutive games.

Dave had a BA degree from George Williams and two master's degrees from the Jane Adams School of Social Work and the University of Illinois. His doctorate in education was from Loyola University.

He served as a president of the Illinois Association of School Social Workers and president of the Illinois chapter of the U.N. association. He owned and ran a day camp, Pioneer Trails Day Camp, for 25 years in Des Plaines.

Rabbi Barri Schechter of Kol Emeth synapogue remembers. "The first time I heard David, he took part in a debate at Kol Emeth about whether to be a good Jew it was necessary to be a member of a synagogue? David argued no, it's not necessary. The next thing I knew David joined Kol Emeth!"

He not only joined, but after his retirement, he became very involved, served as president, sang in the choir (his mother wanted him to become a cantor)' and was an active member of several committees. He also spent two days each week as a volunteer at Highland Park Hospital.

He is survived by his wife, Lorri, two daughters, two grandchildren and three great-grandKosen

children.

Dave was an outstanding reader and liked to share information with his many friends and colleagues. His daughter Nancy says, "He took great pleasure in all human beings, seeing the better side of everyone, loved music. theatre. outdoors, and especially golf. He was extremely proud of his family and was a loving husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather."


His daughter Michele added: "he had an unbelievably great sense of humor; he had a joke for every occasion."

Dave Rosen knew the art of living a full life every minute. He knew how to inspire people to care and love and share. He was an asset to his family, his many friends, and the community at large.

It was a privilege for me to be a friend of David Rosen. In the way he lived his life, he earned the Yiddish title "a true mensch."

May he rest in peace.
